KATE IN PARLIAMENT

We began the year with a win for compassion after the announcement that 19,000 refugees living on temporary visas will become eligible for permanent residency.

The Government finally listened to the feelings of despair from our community at the treatment of refugees in the past. The week before the announcement I spoke in Parliament about the work that various groups in Curtin are doing to support refugees.

In February I also spoke in Parliament on bringing transparency and integrity to political campaign donations, the 15th anniversary of the National Apology for the Stolen Generations and the need for urgent action on vaping.

I met with a range of Ministers, including the Treasurer on the wellbeing economy, the Minister for Immigration about the TPV announcement and the Minister for the Environment and Water, Tanya Plibersek, about updating the EPBC Act.

Along with the rest of the crossbench, I had constructive meetings with the First Nations Referendum Working Group and the Prime Minister, about the progress of the Voice Referendum.

THE VOICE TO PARLIAMENT

Conversations about the Indigenous Voice to Parliament have started in the Curtin community and the media, and will continue throughout the year.

Before the referendum (October – December), I will be holding events on the Voice, to ensure that we all have the opportunity to hear from constitutional experts and Indigenous leaders.

I'm keen to ensure that we reduce misinformation and are able to have an open, honest discussion about what the Voice is and isn't.

VAPING

I've asked the Government to urgently address the dramatic increase in the number of people, especially young people, taking up vaping.

I'm hearing growing community and expert concerns about how easy it is for kids to buy vapes over the counter, some containing nicotine.

To end the vaping black market, I believe we need a ban on importation and supply of all e-cigarette products (except by pharmacies for smokers with a prescription).

NET ZERO

We are kicking off our Curtin Pathway to Net Zero project, and are seeking volunteers to contribute to four working groups from across the community on each of our four major emissions sources here in Curtin: Energy, Transport, Built Form, and Greening. These groups will work on educating us about opportunities to reduce emissions at the Sustain Curtin Fair and identify project opportunities.

We are also seeking expressions of interest to put together a group to explore a home electrification pilot here in Curtin. The scale and scope is still to be determined!

SUSTAIN CURTIN FAIR



We are really excited about this huge event that we are planning! Sustain Curtin will be a day long exhibition of the ideas, products, businesses, advocacy, and education that are promoting a broad range of sustainability solutions. As we transition to net zero, we will all need to make changes, and this event is designed to give you some tips on how to play your part.

There will be demonstrations and panel discussions about waste, recycling, energy, fashion, and food consumption as well as activities for kids.
